- **Demolition/Constuction** (wood, drywall, flooring, roofing, doors, windows, etc.)


Only people authorized by site attendants may utilize the landfill facility. You must provide your own labor for unloading materials. Due to safety concerns, we do not permit salvaging once waste is placed into containers.

#### PLEASE READ SIGNAGE

The Landfill's address is 3240 Berlin Drive. The diagram to the right illustrates the entrance to our facility (the landfill is the second right on Berlin Drive). The landfill entrance is equipped with inbound and outbound scales – all landfill customers must scale in and out. Department staff are available at the scale to direct you on disposal options and collection of payment.

For mailing, billing, and other departmental questions our office is located at 3200 Berlin Drive (first right on Berlin Drive) and parking is available on the south side of the building. We can also be reached at (608) 785-9572.

# 2022 Village of West Salem Guidelines for Yard Waste/Twigs, Branches, Leaves, Christmas Trees, Large Items, Tires, TVs & E-Waste

**Automated Pickup:** It's How We Roll!

This information is for single-family to 2-family duplex residential units only, if more than 2 units, please contact your current hauler.

Garbage will be picked up weekly on Mondays and Tuesdays. Recyclables are picked up bi-weekly. Please refer to the map on page 3 to see your day of collection. Garbage and Recyclables must be placed in the carts from Hilltopper Refuse and Recycling Service Inc. These are the **ONLY** containers that are picked up. Carts have a 10-year warranty from the manufacturer. If they lose a wheel, if the lid comes off, or other "normal" repairs, the cart will be repaired or exchanged by Hilltopper Refuse and Recycling Service. There is no cost to the resident for these types of "normal" repairs. The carts have an identification number and are to remain at the address assigned to.

### **Additional Garbage**

Garbage set beside the cart, put out in bags or a can, will not be collected. You can wait and put the extra trash in the cart for the next collection, or haul it yourself to the La Crosse County Landfill or Hilltopper. Both charge a small fee for disposal. If you intermittently have additional trash, you may purchase stickers from Hilltopper for additional bags of trash. These stickers must be paid for in advance, placed on the bag, and set next to your cart for pickup. If you find you need more than one cart, contact Hilltopper Refuse and Recycling at 783-6727 and make arrangements to have an additional cart delivered. There is an additional annual charge for the second cart. You will be billed directly by Hilltopper.

#### Large Article Pickup

Large article pickup service is not provided by the Village of West Salem. Residents must contract on their own for collection or disposal. If your large article is something that someone else could benefit from, consider Habitat for Humanity Restore, 608-785-2375.

Please check your local yellow page listings for Garbage Collectors.

The La Crosse County Landfill has a citizen drop-off site at 6500 Hwy 16 also. See front cover for additional information. There is a small fee for large articles at drop-off.

#### TV's, Appliances & E-Waste

TV's, appliances, computers (desktops, laptops, notebooks, tablets), desktop printers (including those that scan, fax, and/or copy), computer accessories (including monitors, mouse & keyboards, scanners, hard drives, speakers, flash drives, modems), DVD players, VCR's, DVR's, fax machines and cell phones. Residents can take these items to the following places:

#### Fire Hydrant Flushing (----- on calendar)

Fire hydrants will be flushed April 11-15 and September 12-16. During this time rusty or discolored water may be noticed, which is only temporary.

#### **Christmas Tree Pickup**

Christmas trees are collected curbside during the month of January only. Please remove tinsel, ornaments, lights, etc. Trees placed in bags will not be picked up.

# **Unacceptable Trash**

#### **Construction materials**

Items include: roofing materials, bath tubs, shower enclosures, windows, siding, sheet rock, lumber, brick, concrete, asphalt, and kitchen cabinets.

### **OUTDOOR** BURNING RESTRICTED of West Salem nances prohibit

#### Hazardous materials

Cleaners, solvents, gasoline, oil, or other toxic, corrosive, explosive, or highly combustible materials may not be placed in the regular trash. Refer to the front page to see which hazardous materials are accepted at the La Crosse County Household Hazardous Materials Site. If in question, call the facility for a recommendation at 608-785-9999.

#### Vehicle parts

Vehicle parts and other metal weighing 10 pounds or more will not be collected. Take such items to a salvage yard.

**SNOW/ICE REMOVAL NOTICE:** All sidewalks shall be cleared of snow and ice within 24 hours after the snow ceased to fall or within 24 hours of the formation of ice, and cause the same to be kept clear from snow and ice, provided that in case the snow shall continue to fall for some time, it shall be removed as soon as practicable after it has ceased to fall and provided that when the ice formed upon any sidewalk so that it cannot be immediately removed, the person herein referred to shall keep the ice sprinkled with salt, an ice melt product, or sand. No person in the course of removing snow or ice from any private property shall cause or permit the snow or ice to be placed or left on any public way, including any public sidewalk or roadway. (Ordinance 5:04(J)

**No other notices will be sent.** If the Village finds that a sidewalk is not in compliance, you will be charged for removal each time snow or ice is removed from the sidewalk by Village employees according to the provision set forth in Ordinance 5.04(L). Your cooperation is appreciated!

#### Yard & Garden Waste VILLAGE RESIDENTS ONLY

The Yard and Garden Waste Disposal site is located on West Avenue North, just north of the Village Garage. Bags and containers must be emptied and properly disposed of in garbage cans provided at the site.

The following materials may be left at the yard waste disposal site, in the designated areas listed below only, at any time during daylight hours. This area is for your convenience. Please do not abuse it by not following the regulations, leaving household trash or other unacceptable items. This site is monitored by security cameras and violators will be ticketed.

No person shall permit grass clippings from mower swaths to remain upon sidewalks, street pavements, gutters of any public street, or on abutting property not owned or occupied by said person. Placing these items in the gutter may create problems with our storm water system and may cause a backup. VIOLATERS WILL BE TICKETED.

#### Tree Limbs & Brush ( on calendar) VILLAGE RESIDENTS ONLY

Brush chipping is a service to Village residents and is to be used on an occasional basis such as spring cleanup and/or storm damage. The service is not to clear woods, remove large trees or clear building sites. It is not for larger properties with many trees to use on a constant basis. Properties repeatedly using this service will be notified that their brush will not be chipped.

The Village collects tree limbs and brush curbside on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of each month from April through October. Tree limbs and brush may not be placed on any boulevard for regular Village pickup more than 5 days prior to the scheduled pickup date. Violators will be ticketed for littering on public right-of-way. (see calendar opposite). Please follow these guidelines:

- Brush must be cut less than 12 feet long and cannot be thicker than 6 inches in diameter. Disposal of brush in excess of 6 inches diameter is the homeowner's responsibility. Branches shorter that 24 inches and less that 34 inch in diameter should be taken to the yard waste disposal site.
- Brush and tree limbs should be placed curbside no later than 7:00 am on **collection days,** and must be neatly stacked with stems pointing in one direction. Tree limbs and brush may also be bundled tightly.
- Residents are allowed to place 2 piles no more than 12 feet long by 4 feet high for scheduled pickups. Disposing of tree limbs and brush in excess of this amount is the resident's responsibility. If a resident hires a private tree service to assist with brush clearing, the tree service is responsible for disposing of the material. The Village of West Salem does not allow private tree services to use the Village disposal site.
- Tree stumps, roots or shrubs with intact root balls will not be collected and disposal of such is the responsibility of the resident.

### **Curbside Trash Guidelines**

Garbage is collected every Monday and Tuesday and Recycling is picked up every other Monday and Tuesday. (Please see calendar below.) Your pickup day may be delayed one day in the event of a holiday.


**ALL** of Garland Street and NORTH of Highway 16 extended west of West Avenue will be picked up on Mondays.

Residences located South of this line will be picked up on Tuesdays.

- Both garbage and recyclables should be curbside by 5:00 a.m. and placed 3 feet apart.
- Do not set carts at the collection point more that 12 hours before scheduled collection.

• Carts need to be removed from the collection

point within 12 hours of collection. If your garbage or recycling was NOT



#### **WINTER TIPS**

- Clearing snow after each snowfall will make it easier to move your cart to its collection point
- Clear a path from your storage location to your collection point
- Clear a path at your collection point so
- Carts will NOT be collected if placed on a snow bank
- Do not place in gutter/street

#### PLACEMENT GUIDELINES-DO NOT PLACE CARTS IN STREET

- Make sure the arrows on the lid are pointing out toward the
- Cart needs to be at least 3 feet from any fixed objects, such as mailboxes, trees, streetlights, or parked cars and must have a 3 foot gap between the carts.

## **Refuse (Brown Cart)**

Refuse is picked up weekly Monday and Tuesday. Please refer to the map above to find out which day is your collection day. Trash should be placed in clear or semi-transparent plastic bags or placed loosely in your cart and placed out by 5:00 AM on your pickup day or the evening before.

#### **Recycling (Blue Cart)**

Recycling is picked up bi-weekly Monday and Tuesday. Please refer to the map above to find out which day is your collection day. Do not place recyclables in bags; recyclables must be placed loosely in your cart and placed out by 5:00 AM on your pickup day or the evening before. The Village of West Salem utilizes a Single-Stream recycling system, which means all recyclable items can be placed in the cart together.

#### PAPER

- Newspapers, shiny inserts
- Magazines
- Pressed paper, office paper, cardboard
- Toilet paper & paper towel cardboard rolls
- Cereal, cracker, snack boxes (not the plastic inserts)
- Soda, beer boxes
- Toothpaste, soap, detergent boxes
- Paper egg cartons
- Mail, junk mail, etc.
- Shredded paper (place in clear plastic baq)
- Cards, gift wrap (no tissue or foil paper)
- Corrugated cardboard (cut into pieces if it won't fit)
- Books; soft and hardcover
- Soup and drink cartons

#### **METAL**

- Aluminum, tin, steel cans
- Empty aerosol cans (throw away cap), empty paint cans/lids
- Aluminum foil, plates, containers
- Christmas lights, extension cords, electrical wiring (no coaxial cable)

NOTE: If paint cans are not empty, but paint is hardened, they can go in regular trash.

- Position the cart on as level of a surface as possible, away

#### **GLASS**

Glass jars and bottles (any color)

#### DO NOT RECYCLE THESE ITEMS

- Styrofoam and packing peanuts
- Bottle or jar lids unless its #'d plastic
- Soiled paper plates
- Ceramics and dishware
- Windows and Mirrors
- Plastic wrap and plastic bags
- Photographs
- Batteries
- Electronics
- Medical Waste
- Plastic Baskets
- Plastics #3, #4, #6 and #7
- Clam shell to-go food containers
- Beverage paper cups (no lids or straws

#### RECYCLING TIPS

- All containers should be rinsed
- Remove all lids and if they're not marked with a recycling symbol throw them away
- Paper bags, newspapers and office paper should be thrown loosely into the recycling cart; do not
- Break down the cardboard and pressed paper materials to make more room in your recycling cart

Disposable plastic bags (those typically given out at grocery stores or other retail outlets) are NOT to be placed with recyclables in the Village of West Salem recycling system. These bags should be returned to a retail outlet that has a plastic bag recycling container.

#### REASONS FOR MISSED COLLECTION

- Cart is not placed out correctly
- Recycling is placed outside the cart or in a different container
- Cart is overflowing, lid does not close
- Cart was placed on a snow bank; they must be placed on a level spot on the boulevard or on your driveway
- Unacceptable items are in the cart (refuse items, appliances, electronics, hazardouswaste, etc.)

### Household Hazardous Materials Facility (HHM)

Free for La Crosse County, WI Residential Users (unless otherwise noted below)
Houston County, MN and surrounding Counties (Fees apply).

#### **Acceptable Materials**

- Automotive fluids
- Batteries (rechargeable, lead acid, lithium)
- Cell phones and digital cameras
- Cleaning products
- Computers (desktops, laptops, tablets)
- Computer peripherals (fax machines, hard drives, keyboards, mice, printers, scanners, speakers)
- Fluorescent light bulbs
- Lawn and garden chemicals
- Medications (non-controlled only)
- Mercury-containing devices (barometers, thermometers, thermostats, etc.)
- Microwaves and small Freon appliances Fees Apply
- Paints, stains, varnish and solvents
- Pool chemicals
- Propane cylinders (handheld only)
- Sharps and needles
- TVs and computer monitors Fees Apply
- Video devices (cable and satellite receivers, DVD players, gaming consoles, VCRs, etc.)

### **Non-Acceptable Materials**

- Compressed gas cylinders (other than propane)
- Controlled substance medications
- Explosives (inc. black powder, fireworks and military munitions)
- Shock sensitive materials (picric acid, etc.)
- Radioactive materials (inc. smoke detectors)

### SAVE YOURSELF A TRIP!

These items can and should go into your regular curbside trash or recycling:

- Alkaline batteries (trash)
- Dried out paint (trash)
- Empty paint and aerosol cans (recycle)
- Fertilizer without pesticide (trash)
- Ice melt and rock salt (trash)
- Incandescent light bulbs (trash)

Residential users with more than 200 lbs of material are encouraged to schedule an appointment.

Out-of-County residents are welcome to use the program on a fee basis.

#### FREE PRODUCT REUSE ROOM!

Over 80,000 pounds of useable household products are sorted and made available to the public in our Reuse Room annually. All items are free, but donations are appreciated. The Reuse Room is open Monday – Friday from 8 AM to 4 PM. The Reuse Room is located on the east side of the landfill office building, directly adjacent to the HHM Facility.

### Safe Transportation of Hazardous Materials

- 1. Never mix chemicals.
- 2. Bring items in original containers or clearly mark contents. Tell facility technician if you are unsure what is in a container.
- 3. Tighten all covers and lids.
- **4.** If a container is leaking, pack it separately in a leak-proof pail or tub.
- **5.** Avoid spills. Place waste containers upright and place securely in the trunk or back of a truck or van. Do not transport waste containers in vehicle passenger areas.
- **6.** Gasoline should be transported in a designated red safety container.



- 7. Motor oil should be transported in a durable and leak-proof container labeled with the words "Used Oil."
- **8.** Tape the terminal ends of batteries with clear tape to prevent arcing. Do not co-mingle batteries with chemicals.
- **9.** Transport fluorescent bulbs securely to avoid breakage. Do not tape bulbs together.
- **10.** Upon arrival, pull under the HHM canopy and remain in your vehicle with the engine shut off.



- Needles, syringes, auto-injectors (EpiPens) and lancets must be transported in sealed, puncture-resistant containers.
- Container options include a standard red sharps container or a thick plastic laundry detergent bottle with screw on cap. All containers must be labeled with the word "SHARPS."
- Additional sharps collection sites can be found on the Alliance to HEAL website.
